9th Grade

- Find a place that needs a volunteer or can hire you every summer to build responsibility
- Create experiences to discuss during an interview or write about in an essay. "The more life
 experiences you have the more opportunities you have to talk about your life"

10th Grade

- PSAT = Practice for the SAT. Use the feedback and results from the PSAT to get an idea of where
 you test
- If you score in a lower percentile on the PSAT, either strengthen your test-taking skills or leverage your grades and resume to mitigate
- Carve out test prep time
- Carve out time for journal-writing so you begin feeling comfortable writing a college essay

11th Grade

- "Choose to challenge yourself", i.e. take the more difficult class in the subject area in which you already excel; continue with your language classes; etc.
- Remember, "Who you are at the end of junior year is who you are when marching into the college application process."

12th Grade

- Apply to college
- Invest time getting to know the college counselor and give the counselor time to get to know you

9th - 12th Grade

 Develop a relationship with your teachers - this helps your teachers understand that you are invested in learning

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
