2023 School Year Kickoff with our **B.E.S.T.** Member School Colleagues



Since our founding in 1987, B.E.S.T. identifies and supports academically ambitious Black students from families with financial need in the Baltimore region who will thrive in an independent school. We identify candidates for the independent school admission process for grades K-9 through strategic recruiting partnerships with public and parochial schools, and other nonprofits and organizations in our city serving young people, including academic, arts, and athletic programs. And after thirty-six years, we receive substantial referrals from families throughout Baltimore. Following a comprehensive admission process each June through September, when a family is accepted into the **B.E.S.T.** program, they receive individual admissions counseling and support as they apply to our Member Schools, as well as a comprehensive overview of additional Baltimore area educational options. Included is Independent School Entrance Exam (ISEE) preparation for students, an ISEE Exam, a Financial Aid Workshop for parents/caregivers, a Member School Fair for **B.E.S.T.** applicants, and personalized, continuous guidance throughout the entire process.













B.E.S.T. Student, Family and Alumni Support Programming

B.E.S.T. Programming is thoughtfully designed to provide impactful opportunities for connection, leadership development, essential support, and engagement. Our programs and support are intended to enrich each family's independent school experience and strengthen their relationship with both **B.E.S.T.** and their Member School. We also create opportunities for meaningful, sustained engagement with our college-aged and older Alumni. Many of our Programs are featured throughout this Report.

SUMMER SCHOLARS

Summer Scholars, our longest-running, signature support and transition program, prepares our newly enrolled **B.E.S.T.** Middle and Upper School students for the rigor and opportunities awaiting them at their new independent schools. We spend the duration of the program ensuring that our students are affirmed and celebrated, and that - as our newest members of the **B.E.S.T.** family - they feel connected to **B.E.S.T.**, each other, and the broader independent school community.

An engaging curriculum comprised of academics, athletics, art, field trips, study skills, advisory and affirmational programming provides the experiences necessary to support a smooth transition for our students and enables them to engage fully when they arrive at their new independent school in the fall. Additionally, Summer Scholars establishes a rich network for our students of friends and faculty who will stay with them long after the summer is over. In addition to rigorous academic courses, Summer Scholars 2023 featured the following experiences:

The Gilman Black Alumni Leadership Institute (GBALI) is a nonacademic co-educational leadership program designed to expose Baltimore Area high school students to business, college, career and life concepts not typically addressed in the curriculum and pedagogy of most schools. Since 2005, the foundation of GBALI has been the idea that success is defined by more than a career, and that a

career is determined by more than academics. Emphasis is placed not only on educational and career choices but also on the importance of interpersonal relationships and accountability to oneself and others. GBALI students develop a more complete and stronger understanding of the connection between decisions, career, friendships and family.

B.E.S.T. is proud to partner with GBALI in supporting our shared students. The 2023 cohort included 16 **B.E.S.T.** students.
